NEWS FROM THE REAL WORLD & CYBERSPACE

Q. I know charity Bingo halls across the U.S. have varying prize payout limits, but there are other kinds of bingo halls, and I’d like to know if there have been big money winners at any of those places.

A. There have indeed been some big Bingo winners across the U.S. Here is a sampling.

Foxwoods’ Firecracker Bingo - \$1M
One of the first bona fide million-dollar bingo wins in the U.S. took place at the Foxwoods Resort Casino in Connecticut. To celebrate 25 years of bingo operations, Foxwoods hosted a high-stakes “Firecracker Bingo” event on July 2, 2011, and it paid off big. Jennifer McKenzie, from Niantic, Connecticut, hit the jackpot and took home \$1 million in cash. This was a landmark moment, as it proved American bingo halls could produce seven-figure winners.

Birthday Millionaire at Lone Butte
In 2018, an Arizona man got an unforgettable birthday present courtesy of bingo. While playing the Bingo Millions game at Gila River’s Lone Butte Casino (in the Phoenix area), this unnamed 34-year-old hit the top prize of \$1 million on his birthday.

The Bingo Millions game is billed as “the world’s richest regular session bingo game,” and it lived up to its name that night. The birthday winner’s life-changing jackpot underscores how newer bingo innovations (like nationwide linked progressives) have made million-dollar payouts a reality in American bingo halls. Not a bad way to celebrate turning another year older.

‘Lucky Tara’ Strikes it Rich - \$250,000
Sometimes you don’t need a million to make bingo history. In 2018, a player known as Tara (a Pennsylvania resident visiting New York) won \$250,000 at the Seneca Gaming

& Entertainment bingo hall in Salamanca, New York. This quarter-million jackpot came during the Seneca casino’s 36th anniversary Million Dollar Bingo Special. Tara managed to get a coverall in 48 calls, landing the biggest bingo payout ever recorded in Western New York. She was just one ball short of the \$1 million grand prize.

Record Cash Ball at Santa Fe Station - \$199,578

Las Vegas makes the list with a record-setting bingo Cash Ball jackpot. In May 2025, local player Clementine K. hit a \$199,578 jackpot during the 3 p.m. bingo session at Santa Fe Station casino. This win was the largest bingo cash-ball jackpot in Station Casinos’ history, according to the company. The Cash Ball is a progressive bonus in Station’s bingo halls, and Clementine’s nearly \$200,000 prize had been building up for months before her lucky numbers came in. Her win generated plenty of excitement (and some joyful screaming) in the northwest Las Vegas Valley.

Lucky Eagle Jackpot - \$133,639
In August 2014, Dorothy Black of Olympia, Washington, made headlines by winning \$133,639 at the Lucky Eagle Casino & Hotel, the largest bingo prize in that casino’s history.

The CEO himself presented Dorothy with an oversized check to mark the occasion. She won the jackpot playing a standard session at Lucky Eagle’s bingo hall, which shows that sometimes even smaller tribal casinos can produce six-figure winners. For Dorothy, a long-time player, this amount was truly life changing. Her big win is fondly remembered in Washington’s bingo community as proof that persistence and a bit of luck can lead to a record-breaking bingo haul.

Black Rabbit (TV-MA) — Netflix has been giving us a few good shows to binge at this moment, and next up is this crime-

thriller miniseries led by Jude Law and Jason Bateman. The duo plays a pair of brothers: Jake (Law), a New York City club owner, and Vince (Bateman), his scrappy, chaotic brother. Jake opens his door to Vince during Vince’s time of need, only to find out that Vince owes a large debt to some dangerous loan sharks. Left with no choice but to help his brother, Jake gets sucked into Vince’s turbulent world and faces losing his business if they don’t succeed in getting the money. All eight episodes are out now. (Netflix)

The Morning Show: Season 4 (TV-MA) — Two of America’s favorite leading ladies, Jennifer Aniston and Reese Witherspoon, are back with their hit show *The Morning Show*, and this season looks juicier than ever! Picking up two years after season three, Alex (Aniston) and Bradley (Witherspoon) are dealing with the aftereffects of the UBA network’s merger with NBN, as misinformation and conspiracy theories continue to infiltrate the news. Marion Cotillard is a new addition to the cast and plays an intriguing high-level executive, while Boyd Holbrook joins the cast as a provocative talk-show host. New relationships are teased, and the tension between all the characters continues to rise. (Apple TV+)

Savvy Senior

Find a Handyman

Dear Savvy Senior,

What’s the best way to find a good handyman or tradesman that can help with small jobs around the house? —*Almost 75*

Dear Almost,

It’s a great question. Finding a good home repair/handyman can be a bit of a crapshoot. How do you find someone who will return your calls or texts, show up on time, do the job right and finish it, all at a fair price? Here are a few tips and resources that can help you search.

What Kind of Help

While it may seem obvious, whom you call on for help will depend on what you need done. If, for example, you have an odd job or small home repair project that doesn’t require a lot of technical expertise, a handyman may be all you need. But if you have a job that involves electricity, plumbing, or heating or cooling systems, you’re better off going with a licensed tradesman. Bigger jobs like home renovations or remodeling may require a general contractor.

Where to Find a Pro

Whatever type of work you need, the best way to find it is through referrals from people you trust. If your friends or family don’t have any recommendations turn to professionals in the field like local hardware or home improvement stores, or even real estate agents.

If you don’t have any luck here, there are a number of online resources you can turn to that can quickly connect you to a wide variety of skilled workers in your area.

If you need someone for a home chore or small job, a popular option is TaskRabbit, which lists thousands of freelance workers (called Taskers) that have undergone background checks. Here you can get help with things like furniture assembly; lifting or moving heavy items; mounting or hanging TVs, shelves or pictures; minor home repairs; cleaning services; yard work and more. Taskers set their own hourly rates, which are displayed on their website before you book.



Some other good options for locating handy-people are fix-it franchises like Ace Handyman and Mr. Handyman—these companies vet and insure their staff, but they may be more expensive than TaskRabbit. Or, if you use social networking sites, you could also post a request for a handyman in your Facebook group or on Nextdoor.

If, however, you’re in the market for specialist like a plumber, electrician, painter, roofer or carpenter as well as a handyperson, try Angi.com. They too, vet their independent contractors, and will let you request quotes from several candidates. Thumbtack is another good resource that’s similar to Angi, but they offer more details like average response time, specifics about the work they do, and photos of past projects.

Things to Know

Once you’ve located a few candidates, here are some steps you can take to protect your money and ensure you’re satisfied with the results. First, get a handwritten estimate or digital contract that list the tasks and the hourly rate or project fee.

Also, ask to see their proof of insurance, which covers any damages they may cause while working on your home, and ask for several references from past jobs.

You should also pay after the work is done, not before. But it’s not unusual to be asked for a small deposit for material costs upfront.

And if possible, you should pay with a credit card, because you can dispute the payment if something goes wrong with the job. Checks and electronic payments like PayPal, Venmo and Zelle don’t offer the same level of protection.

Veterans Post



Recent Accomplishments at the VA

The VA has processed more disability claims in one year than they’ve ever done before. They surpassed last year’s total months before the end of this fiscal year. Specifically, the backlog of veterans waiting for benefits is down over 37%.

And that’s not all. In the last six months, the VA has opened 16 new health care clinics around the country. Fredericksburg and North Battlefield Clinics in Virginia, Florence Clinic in South Carolina, and 13 more.

The VA has made it easier for veterans to access community health care, cutting out the middle steps that dragged things out. Additionally, there are 30 categories of care that only require an authorization once a year.

They’ve identified and saved \$106 million from duplicate billings caused by cases where millions of veterans were enrolled in both VA health care and Medicare. Providers were double billing, raking in the cash, and now the VA is going after that money.

Ten thousand workers have been brought back to the office, no longer able to telework. There are eligibility criteria to continue to work remotely, such as a disability or living more than 50 miles from work, but for the most part, they are back in the office.

The VA is phasing out treatment of gender dysphoria; in other words, stopping voice training, wigs, chest binders, hormone therapy and other sex change services. The saved money will instead go to helping amputees and paralyzed veterans.

Veterans at some locations say there is a shortage of physicians and other medical staff, but for the most part it looks like the VA is moving in the right direction.

Mmm Mmm Molasses Pie

Dear Annie,

I need help. My husband went on a business trip to Tennessee and was served a molasses pie. He wants me to make it for him now that he is home. Please help me. I have no idea how to make this pie.

Dear Carol Ann,

Here’s a recipe for a Molasses Pie that I like to make—and it’s easy! Enjoy! —*Annie*



Molasses Pie

- 2 tbsp. flour (heaping)
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 cup molasses
- 4 eggs (separated)
- 1/8 of a pound butter, softened
- 2 unbaked pie shells
- dash of nutmeg, if desired

Mix flour, sugar and nutmeg (if used). Dissolve baking soda in buttermilk and add to flour mixture. Beat the egg yolks. Stir in molasses, beaten egg yolks and softened butter. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Pour in unbaked pie shells and put on bottom shelf of oven. Bake for 30 minutes. Whip the egg whites into a meringue until stiff. Put on top of pie and brown. Makes two pies.

Now in its 20th year, the free family-friendly ranch rodeo featured a wide-variety of competitions throughout the day, including open roping, team roping, Calcutta, and ribbon roping, and team branding. Launched 20 years ago, the Morongo rodeo has grown in popularity over the decades to attract Native and non-native riders from across the country.

The annual rodeo is hosted by the Morongo Band of Mission Indians and the Morongo Cultural Heritage Department.

When you finish your jar, add a fresh round of cucumbers to the brine for quick refrigerator pickles. Don't stop there — zucchini, carrots, radishes, onions, green beans — they all play nicely. Let them sit a few days; the longer, the more pickled. You'll marvel at how simple it is to extend the life (and pleasure) of your pickles.

DIY Condiments That Shine

— Dill Pickle Vinaigrette: Blend 3/4 cup pickle juice with 1/4 cup olive oil and a tablespoon of grainy mustard. Your salad just went from "meh" to memorable.

— The Sauce That's Amazing on Everything: Two parts sour cream, one part pickle juice, salt and pepper to taste. Dress salads, drizzle over vegetables or serve alongside meat, poultry or fish. Your condiment game just leveled up.

Add Zing to Everyday Dishes

A spoonful of brine can elevate tuna, egg or chicken salad. Substitute it for vinegar in recipes, add it to water when boiling pasta for a salad or toss into potatoes for a tangy kick. MUSHROOMS IN PICKLE BRINE BUTTER
Yield: 4-6 servings
Total Time: 40 minutes

6 tablespoons butter, divided
6 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided
1 sweet onion, thinly sliced (1 1/2 cups)
2 1/2-3 pounds mushrooms, thickly sliced or quartered
3/4 cup strained dill pickle brine

Heat 2 tablespoons of butter and 2 tablespoons of olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat.

We're going to saute in batches. When you first add the mushrooms to the skillet, they absorb all the flavorful butter like little sponges. This ensures every mushroom gets some buttery, briny goodness.

Divide onions and mushrooms into thirds. Saute one-third of the onions until soft (3 minutes). Add a third of the mushrooms and cook until tender and golden (5-7 minutes).

When golden and delicious, add one-third (1/4 cup) pickle brine and stir until the brine is absorbed, about 1 minute. Repeat with remaining ingredients.

Resist eating the mushrooms as you cook them while no one is watching. Sharing is expected, apparently.

These mushrooms are earthy, briny and irresistible — pickle juice isn't just a liquid, it's culinary magic.

Luck in Poker is a Matter of Perspective

I recently had the opportunity to compete in the Major Series of Poker: The Tour, otherwise known as the MSPT. In their Season 16 Iowa Poker State Championship, an \$1,110 buy-in no-limit hold'em poker tournament that attracted 815 entrants and awarded a \$789,494 prize pool.

I ended up finishing the tournament in third place for \$69,610, and along the way I experienced my fair share of good and bad luck, albeit much more of the former than the latter.

In one hand early on Day 2, which saw me bring in the second-biggest stack among the 91 returning players, it was Level 16 (4,000/8,000/8,000) when Kanat Ozturk opened for 20,000 in middle position and I looked down at the AhAs in the cutoff. There were some short stacks among the players behind me, so I opted to slow play by just calling in the hope one of them would move all in. Even if they didn't, my hand would be well-disguised.

Unfortunately, the button and both blinds folded and it was heads-up to a flop of 2c4hAc. Ozturk continued for 15,000 and knowing he wouldn't have raised pre-flop with

3x5x — which would give him a straight — I knew I had the best hand. I would usually just call, but with two clubs on the flop I didn't want him to draw to a flush cheaply if he had two clubs in the hole.

As such, I clicked it back with a min-raise to 30,000. He called, the Kd appeared on the turn, and Ozturk checked. I bet 35,000 and he didn't take too long to call, which made me feel he either had the flush draw or possibly pocket kings, in which case he just turned a set.

When the 7h completed the board on the river, I no longer had to worry about a flush, and then when Ozturk led out for 85,000, I was pretty sure he actually had pocket kings. I moved all in and Ozturk snap-called off his remaining 150,000 with the KsKc or so only to discover I had slow played aces.

"I thought I was trapping you," he said before exiting the tournament in 70th place.

I was lucky to be on the right end of that cooler, which allowed me to make a deep run in the tournament. I was also lucky to go from the short stack at the final table down to the final three players, laddering up tens of thousands of dollars in the process. Unfortunately for me, that is where my luck ran out.

In my final hand, the blinds were a hefty 200,000/300,000/300,000 and I moved all in for 4.4 million holding the AcJc in the small blind. Jake Long called from the big with the Ah3h. I was a 3-to-1 favorite, and the 4s7d7h flop seemed safe enough. Unfortunately, me, the 2h turn and Kh river gave Long a nunnerrunner flush to end my run.

I wish I'd won that hand, which would've given me a good shot to win the whole thing, but I wasn't too disappointed. Sure, I got unlucky in that hand, but I got lucky to even get there in the first place. In poker, it's important to keep such things in perspective.

When relatives come to your home during these last few months of the year, make weekend breakfasts extra special when you put this delicious puff pancake on your menu! Also called a Dutch baby, this version of the recipe is simple to prepare with kids and dramatic to serve when it's piping hot and coming right out of the oven. Believe me, mouths will be watering when it arrives at the table. Take a bow, then serve with fresh fruit or your other favorite toppings:



DRAMATIC PUFF PANCAKE

- Serves 4
- 4 eggs
 - 1 cup skim or whole milk
 - 1 cup all-purpose flour
 - 1 tablespoon sugar
 - 1/8 teaspoon salt
 - 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
 - 1 tablespoon powdered sugar and a squeeze of fresh lemon (toppings)

Preheat oven to 425 F. Let one of your kids count and crack the eggs into a mixing bowl. Inspect it to be sure that there are no remaining shells. Beat eggs with a beater until they're light and pale. Another child may measure and gradually beat in the milk, flour, sugar and salt.

Meanwhile, place butter in a 10- or 12-inch cast-iron or ovenproof skillet, or a 9-by-13-inch oven-safe glass baking dish. An adult should place it in the oven until it is hot and the butter sizzles.

Remove from oven and pour batter into the hot butter. Return to oven and bake for 20-25 minutes, or until puffy and golden-brown on the edges. (Keep oven door closed until done.)

Squeeze lemon juice on top, dust with powdered sugar, and serve tableside immediately. Serve with fresh fruit, such as berries, grapes and kiwi slices.

Alternate Blender Method: Put eggs in a blender and whirl for 1 minute. With the motor running, add milk, then slowly add in flour, sugar and salt. Whirl for an additional 30 seconds. Proceed with recipe starting by placing butter in the oven.

Casino Q&A

Lunchbreak Payoff

A Kentucky man on his lunch break ended up with much more than a sandwich. Cameron Greenwell of Waverly purchased a Millionaire Club scratch-off ticket and quickly found out he had won \$10,000, according to a news release from the North Carolina Education Lottery. "I scratch the top part of the ticket for matching numbers, and the first one was the win of \$10,000," the 23-year-old recalled. "I figured that was it." However, the story didn't end there. Greenwell—who works with his father spraying crops—folded up the ticket and tucked it into his pocket before returning to work on his tractor. When he got home later that day, he went on the lottery's website to print out a claim form for his \$10,000 prize. As he waited for the document to print Greenwell said he "decided to scratch off the rest of the ticket. That's when I saw that I hit four 50X \$20 boxes" Uncertain about what he was seeing, Greenwell downloaded the lottery's app. "I scanned [my ticket] like three times," he said with a laugh. Greenwell later drove to the Kentucky Lottery's headquarters in Louisville to claim his jackpot in person, a requirement for larger prize amounts. He told lottery officials that this was only his second time ever playing a Kentucky Lottery game. Ultimately, Greenwell took home \$36,000 after taxes. He plans to put some of the money into savings and use the rest on farming supplies. "Things are just so expensive," he said.

the fated scratch-off lottery ticket from Times Turn Around on East Main Street in Lincolnton, N.C. in August according to a press release from the North Carolina Education Lottery. He told lottery officials that it was a special day for such a big win playing the \$10 Million Spectacular; Aug. 17 was also he and his wife's 31st wedding anniversary. How did his wife reply to the big news? "I texted her a picture of the ticket and she said, 'Call me,'" Douglas recalled with a laugh. After taxes, Douglas and his wife were given \$71,764 by lottery officials. "It was pretty awesome," he gushed, adding, "It's a blessing." He said that the money would go toward his family and his tree-cutting business.

Big Wins in Multiple States

A grandmother of 10 who overcame breast cancer won a historic \$2 million prize in the Pennsylvania lottery earlier this season after winning the largest prize ever awarded from the state's MONOPOLY Progressive Jackpots. There was another historic lottery win in Virginia, where a player won a \$348 million prize in the Mega Millions drawing. They ended up taking home \$155.6 million in a one-time payout and planned to buy a zero-radius lawn mower as their first big splurge. In Michigan, a man who won \$300 on one ticket reinvested some of his winnings by purchasing another ticket, which led to a \$714,891 win.

One Dollar Makes a Millionaire

California Lottery officials recently announced Andrea Willer as the single grand prize winner of a SuperLotto Plus ticket sold in Cotati and worth \$30 million. She opted for a cash payout and walked away with more than \$14 million after taxes. The game costs just \$1.

Anniversary Windfall

A husband and wife in North Carolina are nearly \$100,000 richer after getting lucky while playing the lottery. Jeffrey Douglas, a resident of Cherryville, N.C., picked up




Expired Products at Home?

When the pandemic began over five years ago and our stores were keeping odd hours and sometimes the shelves were empty, many of us stocked up on food and supplies when we could get them. We chose canned goods and dry boxed foods like pasta, as well as staples like bleach and sanitizing wipes. Where are those items now? Are some of them still on our shelves at home, maybe tucked in the back and kept for emergencies? It's time to check those items for expiration dates. Most are likely too old to be used, and many of them can make us sick if we do.

Here are a few hints as you go through your stash: You'll likely need a magnifying glass as you look at each item because the dates are often very small.

The dilemma with foods is that the experts don't agree. Some claim that an expiration date doesn't really mean the food is no longer good, while some say to pay attention to the dates. Plus, there's a difference between "best by," "sell by" and "use by" dates. Confusing, isn't it? I tend to go by the date that's printed as the cutoff date.

Bleach really does expire and lose potency, and so do the sanitizing wipes, antibacterial hand soap and other cleaning products. Look on the product for a lot number and check the company's website for dates of manufacture or how to decode the batch number.

Even your shampoo has a limit to the time it can sit unused in your bathroom cabinet, and so do toothpaste, deodorant, hand lotion, eye drops — nearly everything you use. Go online to www.checkfresh.com. Click the brand of your item and type in the lot number. It will tell you when it was made.



Royal Hits!

There is nothing more exciting than hitting a royal flush when you play video poker. The payout is big—\$1,000 if you are a quarter player, or \$4,000 for a dollar player. But royal flushes aren't so easy to hit even when you hold four to the royal and you need just one card on the draw to fill the royal. My mother- and father-in-law, however, have each hit a royal the hard way. Let me explain.

Both of my in-laws were slot players when I decided to teach them how to play video poker. They learned by playing jacks-or-better on my computer using video poker training software. It didn't take them long before they were achieving 99% playing accuracy, plus they really enjoyed playing. I also gave them video poker strategy cards so they could take them to the casino and refer to them if they were unsure on how to play a hand. At age 90 and 84, their minds were sharp as a tack and they enjoyed the challenge of playing video poker.

In the first three years after I taught them video poker, they tripled their bankroll, plus they enjoyed receiving all the casino perks just for playing: free meals, gifts and rooms. Not a bad life for two seniors with four grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

After those initial years of training, I took my father-in-law to a Mississippi casino to play, what else, some video poker. Of course, we went on a day when the casino had a promotion that multiplies your points giving us more free play and bounce back coupons (for cash) in the mail. It had been a while since my father-in-law had a royal (11 months), even though he had been dealt four to the royal on numerous occasions. But he

just couldn't get the fifth card that he needed for the royal. He knew the odds of drawing the card he needed for the royal was 1 in 47, but it had eluded him for nearly a year.

Now many players get frustrated when they don't get a royal, but not my father-in-law. He knows that on average a royal will hit about once every 40,000 hands. Sometimes it takes a little longer to get that royal, while other times you might get lucky and hit 2 or 3 royals in 40,000 hands (hey, once he hit two royals the same night on the same machine). So, when my father-in-law gets into a royal flush dry spell, like he was in that year, he just keeps playing skillfully knowing that sooner or later it will come.

I was playing next to him when it happened. He hit the deal button and bingo—up popped a dealt royal flush. He didn't have to draw for a royal cause the machine dealt him one. When it happened, the machine automatically locked up and the credit meter was spinning away until it gave him the \$1,150 that he won (it was a progressive video poker machine).

Now you might be wondering what the odds are of hitting a royal flush on the deal. I certainly was curious, so when I got back I did the math and discovered it was a whopping 650,000 to 1. Those are pretty long odds, but as my father-in-law proved, they are not impossible odds.

Now you might be thinking that's the end to this story, but there is more. Way back in 2005 when I first taught my mother-in-law how to play video poker, I took her to a casino in Las Vegas that had good video poker pay schedules. I stood behind her to mentor her as she played video poker for the first time. Then it happened.

She hit the deal button and up popped a five-card royal flush on her screen. Back in those days, the machine didn't lock up if you hit a royal on the deal. I knew instantly that she had just hit a royal flush, but my mother-in-law thought that she had just hit a flush. I showed her that she not only had a flush, but a royal flush, and then I hit the hold button on all five cards, followed by the draw button. The credit meter started spinning and soon she was \$1,000 richer.

Now that's quite a story. I don't believe there is another husband and wife couple on this planet that has accomplished this.

So, what's the moral to this story? Don't give up when you are in a royal flush dry spell because you never know when it will hit. It could happen when you least expect it—including on the initial deal—just ask my in-laws.

Gaming News



Michigan Casino Ranks High

According to *USA Today* readers FireKeepers Casino Hotel in Battle Creek is No. 7 on the "Best Casinos That Aren't in Las Vegas" list for this year. FireKeepers, which has long invited guests to "Get Your Vegas On" without leaving Michigan, is the only casino in the Midwest to make the list. "We are honored to be recognized among the top casinos outside of Las Vegas," said Frank Tecumseh, CEO of FireKeepers Casino Hotel. "This achievement reflects the hard work of our team and our commitment to delivering a premier gaming and entertainment experience for our guests." FireKeepers is listed alongside casinos in New Jersey, Arizona, Mississippi, California and Connecticut.

Two Powerball Winners

A recent Powerball drawing, the second largest in lottery history, yielded two winners who'll share the \$1.79 billion jackpot, one in Texas, the other Missouri. They'll split the \$893.5 million annuity or the \$410.3 million lump sum. In Texas, you have to select the lump sum to remain anonymous; Missouri has strong regulations in place to protect winners. Both winners have 180 days to claim their jackpots.

Manhattan Casino Odds Fade

A Times Square casino proposal backed by Caesars and Jay-Z appears to be dead in the water. A community advisory committee recently voted no on moving forward with the casino bid from SL Green Realty Corporation, Caesars Entertainment and Roc Nation and Live Nation. The group planned to convert the existing 54-story office building at 1515 Broadway, which includes the Minskoff Theatre, the longtime home of The Lion King, as well as the Viacom headquarters, into the casino. The

plans called to build the casino above the Broadway theater, as well as create a luxury hotel, restaurant and entertainment spaces in the building. The recent proposal being shot down means that just one proposal for a Manhattan casino may remain in the competition among developers and casino operators to win as many as three gaming licenses in downstate New York, according to Bloomberg.com.

Big August in AC

Atlantic City casinos had one of their strongest months in over a dozen years in August. Properties produced an impressive \$311.9 million in revenue that month, the New Jersey Division of Gaming Enforcement reported. According to Casino Control Commission Chairman James T. Plousis, Atlantic City casinos crossed \$300 million in revenue for the first time since August 2012. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, the popularity of iGaming in the Garden State has been surging—giving property owners some cause for concern. The summer of 2025, however, has shown that properties in Atlantic City are able to hold their own.

Vegas Poker Palace to Reopen

The Poker Palace, which opened in 1974 and has been under the same ownership for 50 years, has been acquired by Truckee Gaming and after a renovation will reopen, though probably with a new name. Truckee Gaming is based in Reno and owns nine small neighborhood casinos in northern Nevada, including Rail City in Sparks, along with Club Fortune in Henderson. The Poker Palace property will be renovated, with an expanded casino. No budget has been revealed, but the reopening is slated for the end of the first quarter or sometime in the second quarter of 2026.



Pub Quiz Warm-Ups

If earning bragging rights at your local bar during weekly trivia is one of your top aspirations in life, you need more training than Ken Jennings or dusty Trivial Pursuit board games can provide. These five podcasts are the perfect calisthenics for your brain:

Fingers On Buzzers — In this podcast hosted by comedian and "amateur quiz fiend" Lucy Porter, as well as Jenny Ryan (aka "The Vixen" on the British game show *The Chase*), listeners are invited to play along with their weekly quizzes. They also interview people who are behind-the-scenes of your favorite (British) game shows, as well as epic winners and losers of quiz shows from the past and present. If you're a trivia night expert at your local bar, Porter and Ryan want to ensure that you know the proper etiquette you should be displaying

at the pub. Each week, the hosts coach each other on the "quiz syllabus" and test the mettle of their general knowledge with a weekly pop quiz. (FingersBuzzers.com)

Inside Jeopardy! — In this weekly podcast, the producers of the iconic syndicated game show *Jeopardy!* offer an inside look into "America's Favorite Quiz Show," with everything from gameplay analysis and behind-the-scenes stories to special interviews. Recent episodes of the podcast feature special guest and host of *Jeopardy!* Ken Jennings. He details what we can expect in the upcoming season 42, as well as a look back at his special outtakes from season 41. In another special episode, Amy Schneider, who holds the second-longest winning streak in the show's history, joins them to discuss tournament prep strategies and what it means to be in *Jeopardy!* game shape. Quiz, Quiz, Bang Bang — This is a weekly pub-trivia-practice podcast that helps you prepare for a real-life trivia night with straight-up questions and answers. After three weeks of preparation provided by hosts Annie and David Flora, listeners are invited to a live game of quiz bang trivia with four rounds of four questions followed by a final Big Bang round. A Gen X Thanksgiving

Depending on the source, I'm either at the tail end of the Baby Boomer Generation, or I'm at the front of Generation X. In other words, I'm old.

Growing up, all the major holidays were family events—BIG family events, with not only the immediate family, but with all the assorted aunts, uncles, cousins, grandparents, etc. These events were usually hosted at our house, with my mother being the head chef, so to speak. I would help Mama with the kitchen duties, and the two of us would prepare many familiar homemade dishes.

While many Thanksgiving dishes are still with us today, let's take a look at the Thanksgiving tables of Gen X:

—Turkey: Turkey is the star of the show—cooked to perfection with tender, juicy meat, and a slightly crispy skin. Ham is often featured as well. Nowadays, we've eaten prime rib, or chicken, or even Chinese take-out on one sad Thanksgiving.

—Dressing: One of my favorites! Mama and I would cook many pans of cornbread the day before Thanksgiving. As a southern family, cornbread dressing was our dressing of choice.

—Mashed Potatoes: These must be homemade, with gobs of butter.

—Cranberry Sauce: Also homemade. If you think it has enough sugar, it doesn't. You basically want cranberry preserves—to use with the not-so-homemade rolls. No one added fancy ingredients like orange juice or pineapple back then. Cranberries, sugar, water. Nothing else.

—Brown & Serve Rolls: These are "almost done" rolls you put in the oven to finish cooking, and if you're lucky, you don't burn the bottoms (people will still eat them, so don't worry over it). Bonus points if you spread butter on the tops before baking.

—Green Bean Casserole: We all know this one. Green beans, cream of mushroom soup, and those crunchy onions in a can. Those canned (baggied now, I believe) crunchy onions go great on salads, burgers and sandwiches.

—Sweet Potatoes: In the Gen X era, this was Sugary Sam canned sweet potatoes in syrup, mashed with a little brown sugar, maybe some cinnamon or nutmeg, and a heaping pile of marshmallows on top. Cook until the marshmallows brown.

—Mystery Jell-O Dish: This could be ambrosia salad, or pink fluff, or whatever that green one was called. Contents may include nuts, marshmallows, cottage cheese, pineapple, coconut... you never knew. That's what made it a mystery.

—Corn on the Cob: Cooked the same way as the Brussels sprouts. No fancy corn cob holders for us—just grab that box of toothpicks (which you'll need after eating corn on the cob).
