Bingo Boosted by Innovation

Bingo, casinos and iGaming developers are actively creating new forms of bingo to attract a younger generation of players and adapt to fast-paced mobile gaming environments. By blending traditional slot mechanics, video game elements and community features, they have turned online bingo into a dynamic sector of gaming development. Some highlights of Bingo innovation:

Hybrid Games

* The most successful modern variation is Slingo, which combines slot machine mechanics with a standard 5x5 bingo grid. Players spin a slot reel to mark numbers on their card, incorporating wilds, free spins, and bonus rounds.

* Table Game Mashups: Casinos blend bingo with classic table games like poker or roulette, using card suits or wheel numbers as the call triggers rather than standard numbered balls.

High-Speed & Gamified Formats

* Speed Bingo: Traditional games are shortened drastically to fit the preference for quick gaming bursts. Numbers are called rapidly using automated software, resulting in sessions that wrap up in a fraction of the traditional time.

* Video Game Progression: Formats like Bingo Blitz integrate video game

progression, where players earn experience points, unlock new “virtual rooms” or cities, and complete narrative adventures as they play.

Modern Online Platforms

Modern bingo platforms now feature optimized mobile access, live chat, personal promotion systems, achievement models, and real-time game participation features. This is especially noticeable on platforms offering flexible mobile access during live sports viewing hours. Many sports audiences increasingly use second-screen entertainment while following football, basketball, cricket, rugby, or combat sports events. In these situations, fast-access gaming environments with live interaction features naturally fit broader digital entertainment routines.

Features commonly associated with modern platforms include progressive jackpots, themed rooms, scheduled tournaments and chat functions have helped make bingo part of the wider shift toward interactive entertainment built around continuous engagement rather than isolated gameplay sessions. Real-time notification services, interactive features, live participation mechanics and personalized recommendations systems have become an integral part of many digital entertainment experiences, and bingo is no exception.



GAZPACHO

2 cups seeded, finely diced plum tomatoes
1 cup cored, seeded, finely diced yellow bell peppers
1/2 cup peeled, seeded, finely diced cucumbers
1/4 to 1/2 cup finely diced celery
1/4 cup minced carrots
1/4 cup minced celery leaves
1/4 cup minced yellow onion
2 cups tomato vegetable juice (such as V8)
1/2 cup clam juice (optional)
2 tablespoons minced chives
2 tablespoons olive oil
1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
Juice of one lemon
Salt and pepper to taste

Let your child mix all the ingredients together in a large bowl. Refrigerate for at least 2 hours to chill and enhance the flavor. Scoop into a serving bowl and top with shaped croutons.

SHAPED CROUTONS

1 loaf French bread, sliced lengthwise with crust removed
3 tablespoons butter or olive oil
1 garlic clove, pressed
1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese (optional)
Salt and pepper to taste

Make shapes from bread with your favorite mini cookie cutters. Combine melted butter or olive oil with garlic and salt and pepper. Brush on top of cutout bread pieces. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese (optional). Bake in an oven set to 350 F for 10 minutes.

Cook’s Tip: Put freezer-safe serving bowls for gazpacho in the freezer before serving!

I’ve share recipes with spinach as a main ingredient in the past, and I have yet another. I made it for company recently, and it was a big hit. The best part? It’s super easy to prepare. —Annie

A SPECIAL SPINACH SALAD

16 ounces fresh torn spinach or baby spinach
3-4 cups cleaned and sliced strawberries
1 cup pecan halves or pieces
4-6 ounces goat cheese or blue cheese, crumbled
2-3 tablespoons Newman’s Own Family Recipe Italian Salad Dressing (or dressing of your choice)

Pre-wash the spinach leaves in water, spin dry. Refrigerate until ready to use. Toss spinach with sliced strawberries, pecans, and cheese. When ready to serve, drizzle dressing over the salad and toss lightly. Serves 8 to 10.

A CREAMY PEACH PIE

1/3 cup sugar
1 cup sour cream
2 eggs, beaten
3 cups fresh peaches, sliced and peeled
1 9-inch graham cracker crust
Vanilla ice cream, optional

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, combine the sugar and sour cream. Add the beaten eggs and blend well. Add 2 cups of the peaches. Line a 9-inch pie plate with the graham cracker crust. Pour in the creamy peach mixture. Now garnish with the remaining cup of peaches on top of the pie. Bake for 1 hour. Serve with vanilla ice cream, if desired.

New York Bingo Gets a Boost

New Igaming Jurisdiction Launches
For various reasons, not the least of which it's the major growth engine in the gambling industry and possibly augurs the eventual extinction of brick-and-mortar casinos, online gaming is being followed closely within the gaming community. Legal in eight states and available only in seven, igaming's gross gaming revenue was nearly \$960 million in May 2026 and will, by most reckonings, break the billion-dollar bubble sometime this year.



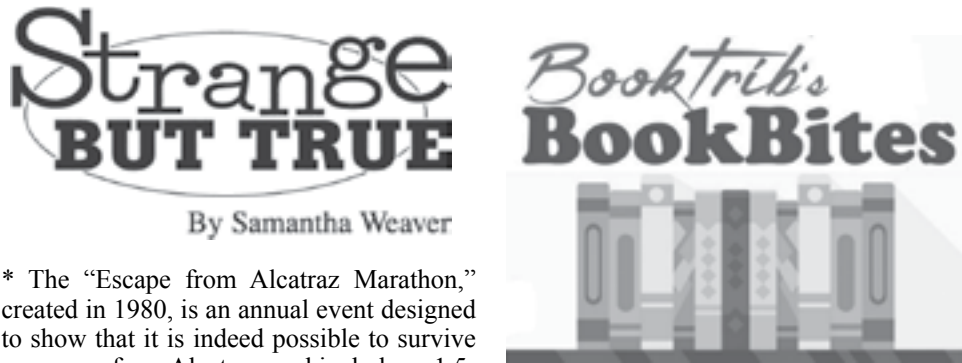

Slot Machine Myth? Or Reality?

Myth: A player sits at a slot you just left and with the very first spin of the reels hits a jackpot. They stole your jackpot.
Reality: Every slot machine has a computer program that generates hundreds of random win-loss symbol combinations every second, 24 hours a day, whether the slot is being played or not. Even if you had stayed and made that next spin, the odds against your hitting the winning symbol combination the exact same second the lucky player did are astronomical. So, no one stole your jackpot. It was just a matter of luck and computer timing.
Myth: Slots on the aisle or at the end of a row pay better.
Reality: Slots in these locations don't necessarily pay better than slots in other areas. They only seem to pay better because a lot of people believe this myth and play them more often.
Myth: If you put \$100 in a slot with an advertised 97% payback, you'll get back \$97 in the time you're at that slot.
Reality: A slot that's advertised as paying back 97% means that its programmed to return 97% of all the money put into it—not just to one player but to all its players and over millions of spins. So, if you dropped \$100 into a slot with an advertised payback of 97% you wouldn't get back \$97 at that slot. You might get more, less, or nothing at all.

for internet casinos is pretty big news, even if it's in Canada. Alberta launched its market for igaming and online sports betting in July, making it the second province to offer the options, after Ontario. The province has been planning for igaming for the better part of two years. Registration opened in January 2026 and gray-market (unregulated) operators were given a deadline to submit completed applications, pay all required registration fees, and cease all unregulated betting activities. Upwards of 30 operators (plus suppliers) were set to go at press time or shortly thereafter, including FanDuel, DraftKings, BetMGM, BetRivers, Caesars, BallyBet, PointsBet, theScore Bet, BET99, Betway, and several Canadian/local players like River Cree iGaming and Play Alberta. Alberta's icasino and sports betting market could generate nearly \$3 billion in revenue over its first two fiscal years, according to numerous estimates and could encourage other Canadian provinces to move away from government monopolies and adopt competitive igaming markets.

Horse Racing in Las Vegas Again?
Horse racetracks have come (infrequently) and gone (quickly) in Las Vegas over the decades. Now, a story on ThoroughbredDailyNews.com (TDN) reports that one Chip Meyers, a Las Vegas resident and Bitcoin vending-machine mogul, wants to try it again. He told TDN that the entire facility would cost upwards of \$550 million, not including the land, which he hopes someone else would buy and lease to his group, and he has half the funding in place; he also hopes to raise the rest through a Hong Kong-type membership model. In addition, to secure a gambling license, he'd need a minimum 200-room hotel, which he doesn't want to build, so as not to compete with the casinos. It's a grandiose vision that he's pursuing vigorously (his wife is the daughter of a long-time horseracing-industry executive) according to sources.

Telehealth

Dear Savvy Senior,

I don’t drive much anymore, so getting to the doctor can be a hassle. They suggested telehealth visits, but I’m not very tech savvy. How does Medicare cover these kinds of appointments?

—*Trying to Keep Up*

Dear Trying,

You’re certainly not alone. Many older adults are running into the same issue. Getting to appointments is not as easy as it used to be, and the idea of using technology for doctor visits can feel a little intimidating at first. The good news is that telehealth has made it much easier to get care without leaving home, and it’s usually much simpler to use than people expect. Medicare covers many of these services, too, making it easier to stay connected with your health care providers. Here’s a look at how it works and what Medicare pays for.

What is telehealth?

Telehealth is simply a way to see or talk to your doctor from home using a phone, tablet or computer. Visits can be done by video, where you and your doctor can see and talk to each other, or sometimes by a regular phone call.

And don’t worry, you don’t need to be a tech expert. Many doctor’s offices use simple systems and will walk you through it step by step. In some cases, all you have to do is click a link they send you or answer your phone at the scheduled time.

It’s also important to understand that telehealth visits are not just quick chats. They are considered full medical appointments. Your doctor can go over symptoms, review medications, discuss test results and recommend treatment.

Does Medicare cover it?

Yes, Medicare does cover many telehealth services. While telehealth has been part of Medicare for years, it was expanded significantly during the COVID 19 pandemic so people could safely get care from home. Those expanded benefits are still in place today.

Right now, Medicare allows you to receive telehealth services from home no matter where you live. Covered visits include a wide range of care, such as reviewing lab results, managing prescriptions, routine checkups, preventive screenings and even evaluating minor illnesses like colds, coughs or infections. In many cases, follow up visits and ongoing care for chronic conditions can also be handled this way.

Another big plus is flexibility. If you are not comfortable with video or do not have internet access, some telehealth visits can still be done using just a regular phone call. And it is not limited to your primary doctor. Many types of health care providers can offer telehealth services.

What’s ahead?

Here’s where things get a little uncertain. The expanded telehealth coverage that began during the pandemic is not permanent, at least not yet. Under current law, these broader telehealth benefits are set to continue through Dec. 31, 2027. After that, Medicare will likely scale back coverage to more limited rules unless Congress steps in and extends the changes.

Even so, some telehealth services are expected to continue long term. Mental and behavioral health care, diabetes education, nutrition therapy and certain dialysis related visits should still be covered. Audio only phone visits for mental health care are also expected to remain available.

If you are curious about telehealth, start by calling your doctor’s office and asking what options they offer. They can guide you through the process and help you feel comfortable before your first appointment.

It may feel unfamiliar at first, but many people find that once they try telehealth, it’s a simple and convenient way to stay on top of their health, especially when getting to appointments is difficult.



You Can’t Win a Tournament Early, but You Can Lose One

They say you can’t win a poker tournament in the early stages, but you can certainly lose one. Tournament poker is a game of patience, and it takes time for the field to go from hundreds or even thousands of players down to a single winner.

You have to survive from one level to another as the blinds and antes increase. Early on, it’s hard to win big pots but easy to lose them, especially if you play recklessly.

A good example of how things can get out of hand took place in Level 7 of the Mid-States Poker Tour’s \$1,100-buy-in, \$1.5 million GTD Main Event at the Venetian in Las Vegas. Players started with 25,000 in chips and began action with the blinds at 100-100. That meant they started extremely deep-stacked, with 250 big-blind stacks.

Blinds were 300-600 with an ante of 600 when a player in the cutoff (the seat directly to the right of the button) raised to 1,500 and the player in the small blind called. Action was then on Joe Cada, one of the most decorated poker players in the world, with more than \$14 million in live tournament earnings.

In 2009, Cada topped a 6,494-player field to win the World Series of Poker Main Event for \$8.5 million at the age of 21. (He’s the youngest player to ever win that tournament.) Since then, Cada has won three other events at the WSOP and holds four gold bracelets, the most prestigious prize in poker.

Not only that, but Cada nearly won the \$10,000-buy-in Main Event again in 2018, ultimately finishing fifth in a 7,874-player field to earn \$2.15 million.

Cada was in the big blind and opted to reraise (also known as three-betting) to 6,500. The original raiser thought long and hard before four-betting to 13,000, and the small blind got out of the way. Cada five-bet all in, and his opponent called off for 40,000.

Cada tabled Kd Kh, which was well ahead of his opponent’s 10h 10c. The board ran out 2c Jh 6s 4h 5h, and Cada collected the pot while eliminating his foe in the process.

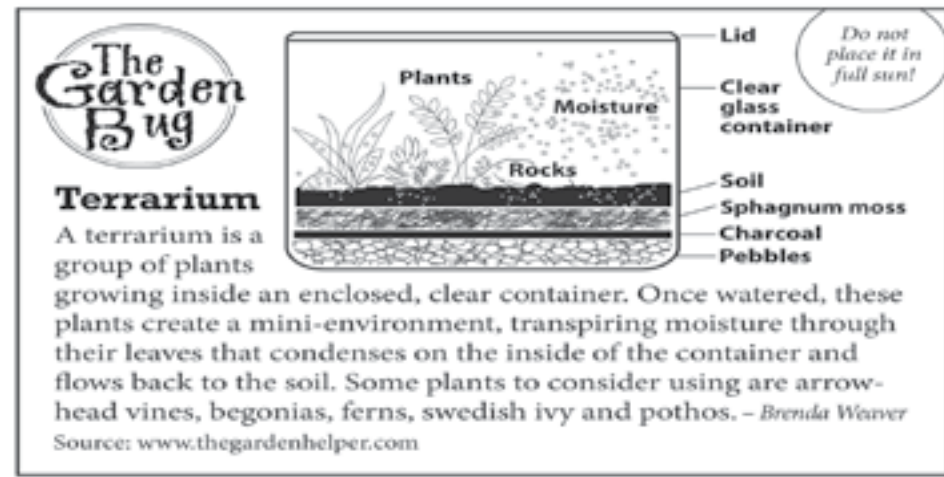
In my opinion, the player in the cutoff got a little too frisky with pocket 10s and could have played them in different manner, one that wouldn’t have cost him all his chips. For instance, instead of four-betting, he could have just called the additional 5,000 to see a flop, leaving himself 35,000 or so behind.

Taking a “small ball” approach helps limit the size of the pot and reduces variance. By four-betting more than a quarter of his stack, the cutoff was seemingly committing himself, and ultimately he felt compelled to call off his stack.

After Cada moved all in, alarms should have been going off in his opponent’s head. A five-bet signifies extreme strength, so Cada was sure to have either a bigger pocket pair or two cards over a 10. At best, the cutoff was coin-flipping for his tournament life early in the event. Is that really the spot you want to be in?

The Most Underrated Bargain in the Grocery Store

Every grocery store has an aisle filled with ingredients people buy without thinking. Flour. Rice. Pasta. Oats. Then there’s the one ingredient many shoppers pass week after week because they’re not quite sure what to do with it. That’s polenta. And it might be one of the best bargains in the store.

Polenta isn’t fancy. In fact, it’s one of the oldest comfort foods around. It’s simply coarse cornmeal slowly cooked until creamy, but don’t let its humble beginnings fool you.

You see, polenta has a marketing problem. It sounds fancy pants, so shoppers assume it’s difficult or expensive. In reality, it’s just cornmeal wearing its Italian name tag.

If you’re wondering whether polenta is just fancy grits, the answer is ... sort of. They’re close cousins. Polenta is usually made from yellow corn and has a heartier texture, while grits are made from white corn and cook up a bit smoother.

A single bag costs just a few dollars yet makes many generous servings. Because its flavor is mild, it happily soaks up whatever you pair it with. A spoonful of butter and Parmesan turns it into comfort food. Top it with hearty meat sauce, roasted vegetables, braised meats, mushrooms or today’s Italian sausage and peppers, and suddenly an inexpensive pantry staple becomes dinner worthy of a cozy Italian restaurant.

The leftovers are where polenta really shines. Once chilled, it’s firm enough to slice. Pan-fry the slices until golden, grill them alongside burgers or chicken, or tuck them beneath a fried egg for breakfast.

If you’re pressed for time, fully cooked tube polenta is a handy shortcut. Just don’t let convenience empty your wallet. Making it from scratch takes only about 20 minutes and costs a fraction of the price.

CREAMY POLENTA

*Yield: 4-6 servings
Total Time: 25 mins.*

2 cups water
2 cups whole milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/3 cups cornmeal
1 tablespoon butter
4 ounces cream cheese, cubed
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

In a large saucepan, bring the water, milk and salt to a boil, then reduce heat to low. Add the cornmeal in a steady stream, whisking to avoid lumps. Keep stirring on low heat until thickened, about 15 minutes. Switch to a wooden spoon and add the butter, cream cheese and Parmesan. Keep stirring. You can tell it’s done when it pulls away from the sides of the pot. Serve immediately.

ITALIAN SAUSAGE & PEPPERS WITH POLENTA

*Yield: 4-6 servings
Total Time: 30 mins.*

1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil, divided
1 pound Italian sausage links
1 large yellow onion, chopped
1 red bell pepper, chopped
2 medium zucchinis, sliced
1 teaspoon fresh garlic, minced
1 (15 oz.) can fire-roasted crushed tomatoes
1 teaspoon Italian seasoning

In a large skillet, heat 1/2 tablespoon olive oil and brown the sausages. They will cook more later, so they don’t need to cook completely now. Set aside and keep warm.

In the same skillet, add remaining oil and saute the onion until softened. Add the bell pepper and zucchini, continuing to cook until both are mostly cooked through. Add the garlic and stir to combine, followed by the tomatoes and Italian seasoning. Let this come to a simmer and return the sausage links to the skillet and let this cook for 10 minutes to marry the flavors and finish the sausages. Serve over polenta.

Sometimes the smartest grocery bargains are the humble, old-fashioned ingredients patiently waiting on the shelf for someone new to discover them.

Top Gun Attraction Announced

Deadline.com reports that Paramount and an entertainment company have announced a partnership to develop a Top Gun attraction on the south Strip. The press release calls it “a next-generation entertainment destination celebrating the enduring values of excellence, teamwork, courage, competition, and the exhilaration of flight. Top Gun Vegas will be an immersive destination that authentically celebrates the excitement, adventure, and enduring spirit of Top Gun while giving fans an entirely new way to experience the brand.” Details so far are sketchy, but the story describes a 2.5-acre site at 4815 Las Vegas Blvd. near the Welcome to Vegas sign that the companies plan to develop, which will include the Hard Deck restaurant and bar featured in Maverick, plus “other dining and retail options and experiences designed to immerse people in the world of the movies.”

Two Big Jackpots at Venetian

A player from L.A. hit a royal flush in spades at Ultimate Texas Hold’em in July at the Venetian. He’d made the Millionaire Progressive side bet, so he won \$2,235,550. Just one week later, a Venetian player turned \$30 into \$764,467 playing Buffalo Diamond Extreme.

Lagasse’s Meril Opens

Celebrity chef Emeril Lagasse has opened his third Las Vegas restaurant, this one off the Strip at the M Resort. Meril, named after his daughter, is described as a “lively Contemporary American restaurant with global influences inspired by Emeril’s travels and the food he loves to eat.” Giving off coffee shop vibes, the menu features breakfast (from biscuits and gravy \$10 to steak and eggs \$28), lunch, and dinner (same

menu, with small plates like meatballs \$16 to BBQ shrimp \$26, flatbreads \$15-\$19, fettuccine \$18, and ribeye \$56). Emeril’s other two restaurants are Delmonico’s Steakhouse at the Venetian and Emeril’s New Orleans Fish House at MGM Grand.

Mob Museum Makes Top 12

WorldAtlas.com selected the 12 best museums in the U.S. from a list of “hundreds, maybe thousands, spanning nearly every major city.” Vegas’ own Mob Museum squeaked in as last on the list, but it’s in pretty heady company. First is, no surprise, the Metropolitan Museum of Art (New York), followed by the National Air and Space Museum (Washington, D.C.), the Art Institute of Chicago, the Getty Center (Los Angeles), and the Museum of Fine Arts (Boston). Two additional art museums and a car, pop culture, WW II and spy museum round out the list. As for the Mob Museum, the description lauds “personal items from Al Capone and Bugsy Siegel” and “the basement-level speakeasy that hosts a working distillery.” It also mentions the Neon Museum nearby.

Poker Room Repopens

The only poker room downtown has been relocated and condensed. The old poker room at the Golden Nugget was 13 tables; the new room, in the Rush Tower, holds nine. But the tables come complete with built-in mobile-device chargers, mobile carts serve food tableside, TV screens showing sports dot the walls, and plenty of space around the tables provide increased legroom. At press time the GN’s Grand Poker Series was in progress and the \$100,000 bad beat jackpot had recently hit \$100,000.

A few months ago, I suggested making a New Routine Bingo card with a task to accomplish in each square, e.g. declutter your closet, or bake a cake from scratch. In the free space, specify a reward for yourself after you complete five items in a row. Another slant to this idea is to make a bingo card—but leave the squares blank. Next, write bingo numbers B1 through O75 on small squares of paper and put them in a closed container. As you make stupid blunders, draw a bingo number out of the container, then jot the blunder on that blank square on the bingo card. For example, left the house but car keys were still on the coffee table; drained three cups of coffee but forgot Baileys in the last one, wondered why it didn’t taste as good; typed the exact same password five times while cursing laptop, then realized caps lock was on. Years ago, when plastic chips were used to mark bingo numbers, woe be the player who yelled bingo by mistake. Those who had cleared their cards had to reset their chips while everyone else waited; sending myriad stink eyes toward the unlucky player. Such fun, then and now. 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How to Scout the Tables

I'm amazed at how many players I see enter a casino and plop themselves down at the first empty seat at any blackjack table. What they should be doing instead is scouting the blackjack tables. Why? The playing rules, number of decks of cards, payoffs for a blackjack, table limits, and even how the dealer shuffles the cards, are not always the same from one table to the next. Following are some tips on what to look for when you scout the tables so that you can play the best blackjack game available in whichever casino you visit.

6-5 payoff for blackjack
Always make sure that the table pays 3-2 for a blackjack, not 6-5 (or worse, even money). In some casinos, the cloth layout will specify if blackjack pays 3-2 or 6-5 or there may be signage on the table that specifies what the payoff is. Here is something to keep in mind: You do NOT want to play any blackjack game, even a single-deck game, if a blackjack pays 6-5. (Reason: The house edge increases

by 1.4% when the casino pays 6-5 instead of 3-2. This is a rip-off and you should avoid playing all 6-5 games.) If you are not sure what the payoff is for a blackjack, ask the dealer before you sit down and play.

Dealer Hit or Stand on Soft 17
Most players know that the dealer must hit their hand if it totals 16 or lower and stand if it totals 17 through 21. However, on some tables, the rules may specify that the dealer must hit soft 17, and on other tables, stand on soft 17. You are better off (by roughly 0.2%) playing on a table where the dealer stands on soft 17 (rather than hits). Check the layout or table signage for the soft 17 rule and if you have a choice, play on a table where the dealer stands on soft 17. (Again, if you are not sure if the rule is stand or hit soft 17, ask the dealer.)

Continuous Shuffling Machine
In the old days, the dealer hand shuffled the cards, or automatic shufflers would shuffle multiple decks of cards after the dealer dealt roughly 70% of them. Nowadays many casinos have reverted to Continuous Shuffling Machines (CSM). The CSM is a combination auto shuffler and dealing device. After every round (or sometimes two), the dealer will place the discards back into the CSM where they will be automatically shuffled with the un-played cards in the CSM (usually a CSM holds four to six decks of cards). You can tell if a table is using a CSM by watching what the dealer does with the discards after each round. If she isn't stacking them in the discard tray, she probably is placing them into the CSM. And that's not good for players. Why? Because when a casino uses a CSM, there is never a pause in the action and, therefore, the casino can deal roughly 20% more hands per hour. That increases the number of hands that a player's bankroll is exposed to the house edge. It is better to avoid all CSMs and instead play on tables where the dealer manually shuffles the cards or uses a traditional auto shuffler that shuffles all the cards.

Betting Limits

If you are a low roller, you shouldn't be betting \$25 a hand. Every table has a sign that specifies what the table minimum and maximum betting limits are. Therefore, check out the tables to find betting limits you feel comfortable playing. If all the low-limit tables are crowded, it is best to wait until a seat opens rather than take a seat at a \$25 minimum table.

Number of Decks

In general, the fewer the number of decks of cards, the better the game is for players. However, you have to check all the rules. For example, a single-deck game that pays 6-5 for a blackjack is a terrible game, whereas if it paid 3-2 for a blackjack, it's a very good game.

Favorable Rule

Player-favorable rules include being allowed to: double-down after pair splitting, double down on any two cards, re-split pairs, surrender your hand, and, as stated earlier, the dealer standing, rather than hitting, soft 17.

Be a smart player! Scout the tables before you sit down and play.

Making Life More Fun

How Playing A Quick Puzzle Can Improve Your Workday

You probably know the feeling: you've been staring at your screen for hours, your inbox keeps growing, and your next meeting starts in five minutes.

Sometimes, the best way to reset is to take a quick moment to focus on something completely different.

Daily puzzle games have become a popular way to take those quick mental breaks, and platforms like LinkedIn are leaning into that trend. LinkedIn's newest game, Wend, blends word finding with logic-based problem solving.

"Wend is a word-finding game where players connect letters in a grid to uncover hidden words, using every letter exactly once," says Helen Smith, Group Product Manager at LinkedIn. "While it may seem like a traditional word game, it adds a logic twist, as players also have to figure out how the entire board fits together."

In addition to Wend, the LinkedIn games lineup includes word-based puzzles like Pinpoint and Crossclimb, alongside logic challenges like Queens, Tango, Mini Sudoku, Zip, and Patches, each offering a different way to exercise your brain throughout the day.

Stepping away from a task for even a minute or two can sometimes be exactly what's needed to return with fresh eyes.

Unlike checking email again or scrolling through your phone, a quick puzzle gives your attention something entirely different to focus on. The result is a short reset with a clear beginning and end, making it easy

to fit between meetings, projects, and other responsibilities.

"That's part of the appeal of LinkedIn's games, which can often be completed in just a few minutes," says Thomas Snyder, LinkedIn's Principal Puzzlemaster and 3-time World Sudoku Champion. "It's a quick mental break that feels especially satisfying when everything clicks into place."

Completing a puzzle may not clear your inbox or finish your project plan, but it can provide a small sense of accomplishment early in the day. For many players, solving a puzzle becomes part of a daily routine—a quick challenge that helps them ease into work mode before tackling larger tasks.

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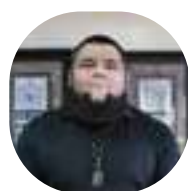
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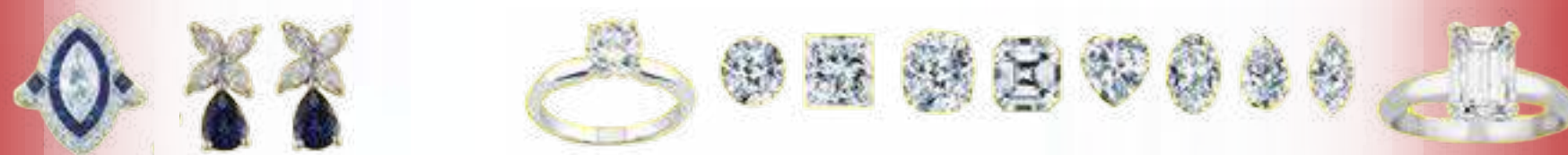
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DEAR DR. ROACH: When is the best time of day to take things like fish oil, vitamin D3 and calcium supplements? — *M.W.R.*

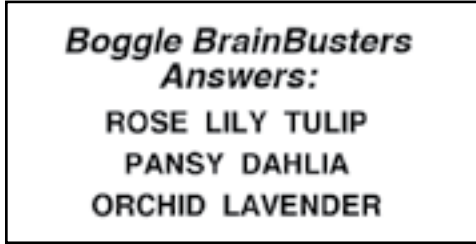
ANSWER: There is moderately strong evidence that fish, or fish oils, may reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease. One or two servings a week of oily fish provides about as much benefit as more. For people who don't want to eat fish but want the benefit, a fish oil supplement daily (of about 1 gram) provides some of the benefit. I recommend taking it with meals to minimize the side effect of "fish burp" and to maximize absorption.

Vitamin D, given to people at risk for deficiency or with proven deficiency, also should be given with meals to improve absorption. Vitamin D is also needed for some people with inability to absorb vitamins properly. I recommend once-daily dosing with the largest meal of the day.

I seldom prescribe calcium supplements anymore. Recent data suggest that vitamin D and calcium together actually increased stroke risk. While vitamin D is important for bone health and is very difficult to get through food, calcium should be consumed as food, not as supplements. In addition to dairy products, many seeds, legumes, almonds and sardines are excellent calcium sources. You shouldn't let it keep you awake at night.

Research Leads to Retirement

A Maryland couple says they can now look forward to retirement with far less uncertainty after a life-changing lottery win. The Dundalk couple, who chose to remain anonymous, claimed the top \$500,000 prize from a Gifts of Green scratch-off ticket in midsummer, according to a news release from the Maryland Lottery. The pair, who both work at a Maryland college and are approaching retirement, said they have a long history of playing instant lottery games together. "We play because we love it," the wife said. "It's something we can have fun with together. We once won \$500. That was exciting." But before they won big, her husband actually did a bit of research. "I'd been checking the remaining big prizes on the lottery website and Gifts of Green had a few top prizes still available," he said. Then, while his wife was going out to the store, he asked that she pick up two tickets for the game, hoping his hunch paid off. After unpacking their groceries, the couple sat down to scratch their tickets together. Within moments, they realized they were looking at something far bigger than they had ever imagined. "My eyes went back and forth between the [dollar sign] symbol and the \$500,000 beneath it and the game's rules. I could not believe what I was seeing," she recalled. "When I looked in her eyes and heard the tremor in her voice, I knew it was something big," her husband added. As for what's next, the couple plans to put the money toward a new car and, perhaps most importantly, a more secure retirement. "We've been trying to figure out how retirement was going to work for us," the lucky woman said. "This takes away so many of the worries."



Q: I inherited my dad's medical schoolbooks from the 1940s and '50s. They're all in very good condition. I've tried selling them online with no takers, and bookstores in the area won't take them. Is there a place where I can sell them, maybe at an antique or vintage bookstore?

A: Textbooks that aren't current don't sell well. A medical textbook from the mid-1800s or earlier might have some historic value, especially if it has advertisements in it. An 1865 edition of "Gray's Anatomy" sold at auction last year for \$168.

A: A firkin is a cask for ale or beer. It held a quarter of an imperial barrel of beer, a little more than a quarter of a U.S. barrel. Firkins were originally made of wooden staves held together by iron hoops. Modern breweries use stainless steel or aluminum containers. The firkins in antiques sales are probably made of wood and more than 100 years old.

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Pick-Six Win in the Nick of Time

A New Jersey player found a winning Pick-6 ticket from last May just eight days before it was set to expire according to New Jersey lottery officials. The \$5.9 million ticket was sold on May 22, 2025, at the Eisenhower Exxon in Roseland, Essex County. According to the lottery, winners have up to one year from the original drawing to claim their prize. When the lottery announced the \$5.9 million prize had not yet been claimed, the winner decided to speak with the employees at the gas station, which just so happens to be a frequent stop for him. "While they didn't know for sure who the winner was, they knew that only a few of their regular players opted for Pick-6 as their game of choice and told him to double-check everything," lottery officials said in a statement. Doing as he was told, the player went back to his home and searched in every spot he might have missed. After checking every possible corner, he decided to go through his closet and check every pants pocket—one of which did in fact have a crumpled Pick-6 ticket stuffed inside. The lottery player confirmed the ticket was the real deal, then immediately took it to the lottery headquarters, arriving midday on May 14. "As always, New Jersey Lottery reminds players to check their tickets. While jackpot prizes going unclaimed is rare, many small tickets sit unclaimed in drawers and pockets for months or years when they could be redeemed for cash!" officials wrote. "Tickets can be scanned at any NJ Lottery retail location or with any phone camera using the NJ Lottery app."

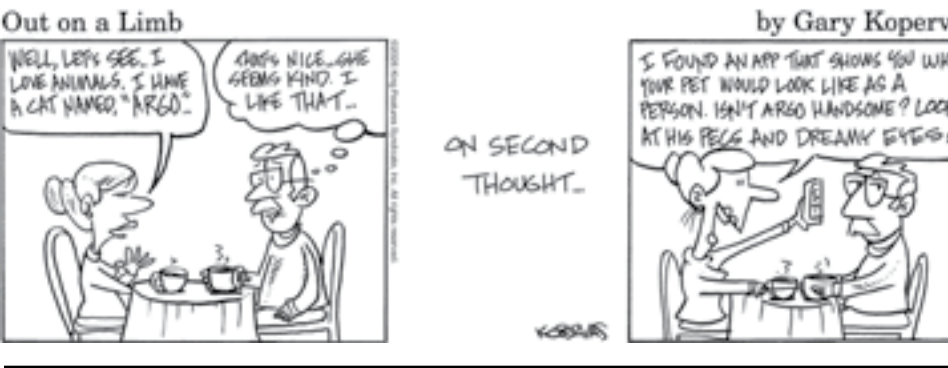

Getting Community Care

The VA spent over \$36 billion on community care in fiscal year 2025, and it appears to be money well spent.

The expenditures were courtesy of the 2018 MISSION Act, which lets veterans get their care out in the community from non-VA health care providers — with the VA picking up the tab. Added to that in 2025 was the Dole Act, which lets veterans seek care in the community without frequent medical reviews or permissions from VA medical staff.

It used to be that veterans had to get a new referral every 90 to 180 days to keep getting care out in the community. Now, for 30 categories of care, new referrals will only be needed once a year.

Veterans in three states in particular benefited from that money: Texas at \$3.3 billion, Florida at \$2.8 billion and California at \$2.1 billion.

If you've already been getting community care, find out from the community care office at your VA medical facility where in the permission and referral cycle you are so you know in advance when the next one will be required. Since most of the medical categories will only need a yearly referral, get your schedule in writing so there isn't a problem at the last minute with an expired authorization.

If you need medical treatment that the VA doesn't provide, or if the wait times at your local VA hospital are too long, or if the driving time to your VA hospital is too long, you might qualify for community care. To get specifics, call the community care office for an initial referral. If you already have a community care provider in mind, find out whether they are part of the VA network before you get care from them to be certain the VA will pay for it.

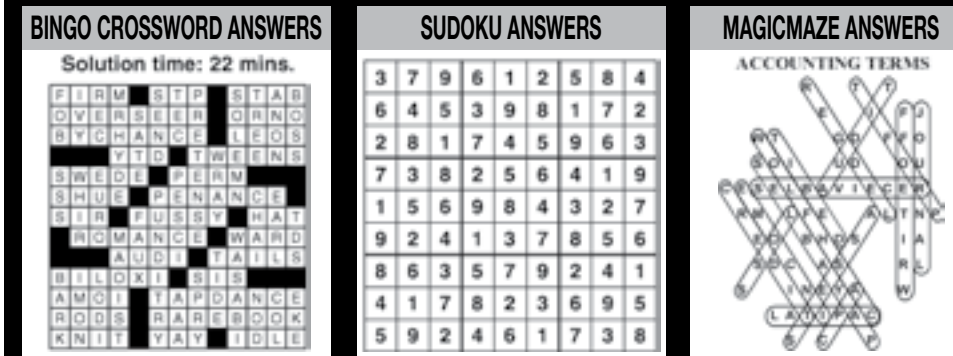
